Many residents in the Annapolis area may find their flood insurance impacted by the recent changes to FEMA's flood mapping.

Anne Arundel County's Department of Planning and Zoning will host an open house in conjunction with the City of Annapolis to educate citizens on their flood risk following the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) recent release of updated Coastal Flood Maps.

Known as Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs), these maps indicate flood-prone coastal areas in Anne Arundel County, and are used by insurance companies to determine flood insurance rates for buildings and contents. County residents and property owners are encouraged to learn more about their flood risk and the updates illustrated on the preliminary maps.

Using interactive flood maps, representatives from the state and county, as well as FEMA and their mapping partners, will be available to answer flood risk and insurance questions, and explain the maps.

The preliminary FIRMs and the associated Flood Insurance Study (FIS) that will be shared provide the basis for flood risk education and floodplain management measures. Anne Arundel County is required to adopt updated maps to continue participating in the National Flood Insurance Program, which makes flood insurance available to the community.

As a result of these map updates, some buildings in the county may, for the first time, be included in a high-risk flood zone, known as the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA). This may result in mandatory purchase of flood insurance for those property owners who are affected. FEMA staff will be at the Open House and will be available to talk to property owners about these updates and what they mean for them.

The county's Open House will be held at South River High School in the cafeteria from 6-8 p.m. Parking is available onsite. Anne Arundel County Department of Health Provides Advice on Water-Associated Health Risks

The Anne Arundel County Department of Health reminds County residents about health risks associated with natural bodies of water and with eating raw shellfish.

Natural bodies of water can contain bacteria, viruses and other microorganisms. Swimmer's ear, an infection of the outer ear, is the most common problem, but other water-related illnesses can be acquired. Disease-causing microorganisms, such as various forms of *Vibrio*, can enter the body through open cuts and sores. Eating raw shellfish can also cause *Vibrio*-related illnesses. Each summer as water use and temperatures rise, cases of *Vibrio*-related illnesses are reported in Anne Arundel County.

People with liver disease or weakened immune systems are at highest risk of serious infection from *Vib*rio bacteria, and they should avoid contact with raw shellfish whether in the water or on the plate. Although rare, *Vibrio* can also cause serious infections in healthy people.

The Department of Health offers the following recommendations:



- Cook crabs, oysters, clams, mussels and other shellfish completely.
- Do not swim in natural bodies of water if you have an ear infection, perforated eardrum, open cut, skin lesion or immunity problem.
- Wash well with soap and water after coming in contact with natural bodies of water.
- Thoroughly clean any cuts or wounds you sustain during water activities. Boaters may want to carry hand sanitizers and first aid supplies in case of cuts and scrapes, especially those related to handling seafood.
- If an infection develops in a wound, seek medical attention as soon as possible.

"I am so proud of all the hardworking men and women in our Department of Aging and Disabilities for enabling our county's Making the Link program to earn this national recognition," said County Executive Laura Neuman. "We live in a great county where help is available to everyone who needs it, and this program is an excellent resource in connecting our older residents and those with disabilities to the assistance they need."

The 2014 n4a Aging Innovations and Achievement Awards recognizes Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) and Title VI Native American aging programs that develop and implement cutting-edge approaches to support older adults, people with disabilities and their family caregivers. A part of the criteria for the selection of the honorees was the ease with which other agencies could replicate the program in their communities.

"With the implementation of the Affordable Care Act underway, our members are investigating new ways to position themselves in the long-term and health care marketplaces, as well as to strengthen longstanding services to meet the needs of America's rapidly growing older adult population," said n4a's Chief Executive Officer Sandy Markwood. The pads are also currently carried by other county agencies such as the Anne Arundel County Fire Department, Department of Public Works and Cashier's Office. Making the Link has also developed a Public Service Announcement, which can be seen in the Primary Care offices at Anne Arundel Medical Center, Anne Arundel TV (Verizon channel 38 and Comcast channel 98), and can be viewed on our website at www.aacounty.org/aging.


